### Handicaps. Why Bother?

I'm not that good. I only play socially. I just play with my husband in couple's events, and we never use my ball. Why should I post my scores when others do not? These are just a few of the reasons used by golfers for not posting their rounds of golf.

As stated by the USGA, "The purpose of the USGA Handicap System is to make the game of golf more enjoyable by enabling players of differing abilities to compete on an equitable basis."

Additionally, it is the player's responsibility to follow the rules of the game for any sport in which you participate. Posting your home and away scores "in a timely manner for peer review" is simply one of the USGA rules of golf.

Part of maintaining an accurate handicap is in the correct application of equitable stroke control or ESC. Charts are posted in the locker rooms with instructions on how to adjust your score to keep your handicap at your potential playing index. Adjustments are not done while playing but rather prior to posting in the computer. In other words, during the round record the actual gross number of strokes taken to complete a hole, check the chart and adjust accordingly, hole by hole, when finished. Post the adjusted lower score on-line.

When tournaments use brackets or flights, handicaps play a major role because they dictate where a player is seeded. Seeing that league challenges and away events rely on the accuracy of what we declare as our handicaps, we need to maintain the integrity of the system by posting all scores correctly. Honest handicaps promote equitable golf competitions.

Have you ever played in an event with a competitor "who doesn't play that often," gets 40 strokes, shoots the best round of their life, and cleans up net by an unheard of number of shots? SURE! Let's all just post our scores!
