The Environmental Division reviewed the referenced project and has determined it falls within the definition of the Tier 3 Categorical Exclusion as defined by the ARDOT/FHWA Memorandum of Agreement on the Processing of Categorical Exclusions. The following information is included for your review and, if acceptable, approval as the environmental documentation for this project.

The purpose of this project is to improve 0.4 mile of Highway 190 and replace a bridge that does not meet current design standards. The project is located within the City of Pine Bluff, Jefferson County. A project location map is attached. The City of Pine Bluff will assume ownership of Highway 190 following completion of the proposed project and ARDOT job 020628.

The existing cross-section consists of three 12' wide paved travel lanes with curb and gutter or 4' wide unpaved open shoulders. There are no existing sidewalks. The average existing right of way width is 57'.

The proposed cross-section would still have three 12' wide paved travel lanes, but the shoulders would all consist of curb-and-gutter with 5' wide sidewalks on both sides of the highway. The new 97' x 54' three-span bridge would be constructed on the existing alignment using a temporary highway closure with a signed detour. The average proposed right of way width would be 116', requiring approximately 0.2 acre of temporary construction easements and 1.3 acre of right of way.

There are no relocations, environmental justice issues, hazardous waste deposits, public water supply impacts, or prime farmland associated with this project. Field inspections found evidence of existing underground storage tanks in the project area, but none that would likely be impacted by construction of the proposed project.

This project has been determined to generate minimal air quality impacts for Clean Air Act criteria pollutants and has not been linked with any special mobile source air toxic (MSAT) concerns. As such, this project will not result in changes in traffic volumes, vehicle mix, basic project location, or any other factor that would cause a meaningful increase in MSAT impacts of the project from that of the no-build alternative.

Based on the ARDOT noise policy, a noise analysis is not required for this project. The project does not involve adding through-traffic lanes, increasing capacity, reducing the distance to noise sensitive receptors by 50% of the existing distance, or exposing noise sensitive land uses to a new traffic noise source. The bridge will be replaced either on the existing location or on an alignment that is not substantially different from the existing alignment. In compliance with federal guidelines, local authorities will not require notification.


The project involves less than 0.1 acre of stream impacts. Construction of the project should be allowed under the terms of a Section 404 Nationwide Permit 14 for Linear Transportation Crossings as defined in Federal Register 82 (4):1860-2008.

The attached U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service species list identified the Piping Plover (*Charadrius melodus*) as a threatened species potentially occurring within the project area. Due to a lack of habitat and distance to known locations for the species, the proposed project would have "no effect" on listed species.

The City of Pine Bluff participates in the National Flood Insurance Program. The project lies within Zone AE, Special Flood Hazard Area. The final project design will be reviewed to confirm that the design is adequate and that the potential risk to life and property are minimized. Adjacent properties should not be impacted nor have a greater flood risk than existed before construction of the project. None of the encroachments would constitute a substantial floodplain encroachment or risk to property or life.

The proposed project would involve minor impacts to two historic properties eligible for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places. The project would require 0.2 acre from the State Highway Department District 2 Complex and 0.01 acre from the Arthur J. Arney & Company Building. These historic properties are subject to protection under Section 4(f) of the Department of Transportation Act of 1966. Due to the minor property acquisition and that none of the eligible structures would be adversely affected, the project qualifies for a *de minimis* finding under Section 4(f). The Section 4(f) *de minimis* evaluation for these properties and State Historic Preservation Officer clearance are attached.

An open-forum public involvement meeting was held on April 30, 2019 at Coleman Intermediate School. A synopsis of this public involvement meeting is attached.

The staff of the Arkansas Historic Preservation Program (AHPP) reviewed the cultural resources survey (CRS) for the above-referenced project. The proposed undertaking entails widening State Highway 190 from two 11-foot travel lanes with no shoulder to three 12-foot travel lanes with curbs and gutter. Additional work will include sidewalk construction from 11th Avenue to Harding Avenue in Pine Bluff. The length of the area of potential effects (APE) in .40 miles (.64 kilometers). The width of the proposed right-of-(ROW) will expand from 58 to 68 feet to 72 to 153 feet (at the bridge over Bayou Imbeau). The project will require acquisition of additional ROW.

The investigation documented one new archeological site: 3JE0513. The site appears to be the remnants of an early to mid-twentieth century structure. The AHPP concurs that Site 3JE0513 is not eligible for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) pursuant to 36 CFR § 60.4.

The proposed undertaking will affect the State Highway Department District #2 Complex (AHPP Resource Number JE0908). The complex consists of five contributing Works Progress Administration buildings (4a-4f). In 2007, the property was determined eligible for inclusion in the NRHP under Criteria A and C. The ROW expansion will require acquisition of .21 acres of the property. The largest portion of this acquisition will be an existing paved parking lot. The remaining acquired area will include a fence and tree line. The AHPP concurs with the finding of No Adverse Effect pursuant to 36 CFR § 800.5(b) for JE0908.

Property 9 is a Quonset hut with vernacular stonework built in 1949. The property possesses integrity and retains the majority of its character defining features. The AHPP concurs that Property 9 is eligible for inclusion in the

Additional ROW expansion will require acquisition of .01 acres of a paved parking lot associated with Property 9. The AHPP concurs with the finding of No Adverse Effect pursuant to 36 CFR § 800.5(b) for Property 9.

The project is within an area of interest for several federally recognized tribes, including the Caddo Nation (Ms. Tamara Francis), the Cherokee Nation (Ms. Elizabeth Toombs), the Chickasaw Nation (Ms. Karen Brunso), the Choctaw Nation of Oklahoma (Mr. Daniel Ragle), the Jena Band of Choctaw Indians (Ms. Alina J. Shively), the Muscogee (Creek) Nation (Ms. Corain Lowe-Zepeda), the Osage Nation (Dr. Andrea Hunter), the Quapaw Nation (Mr. Everett Bandy), and the Shawnee Tribe of Oklahoma (Ms. Tonya Tipton). We recommend consultation in accordance with 36 CFR § 800.2(c)(2).

Section 4(f) Finding of De Minimis Impact

What is Section 4(f)?

Section 4(f) of the Department of Transportation Act of 1966 is intended to protect public parks, recreation areas, wildlife/waterfowl refuges, and important historic sites from being harmfully affected by transportation projects.

Does Section 4(f) apply to the State Highway Department District 2 Complex and the Arthur J. Arney & Company Building?

The State Highway Department District 2 Complex (Figure 1) and the Arthur J. Arney & Company Building (Figure 2) both qualify as historic sites; therefore, Section 4(f) applies. In 2007, the Arkansas State Historic Preservation Officer (SHPO) determined the State Highway Department District 2 Complex was eligible for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP). In 2019 in consultation with the SHPO regarding this project, the Arthur J. Arney & Company Building (Property 9) was also determined eligible for inclusion in the NRHP.

What properties does Section 4(f) protect?

Properties protected by Section 4(f) include significant publicly-owned parks, recreation areas, wildlife or waterfowl refuges, and historic site listed or eligible for listing in the NRHP with national, state, or local significance.

How is the significance of a historic site determined?

The NRHP criteria apply to determine if a property has enough significance to be a historic site. Such properties qualify only if they hold significance in American history, architecture, archeology, engineering, and culture and retain aspects of integrity, and are:

- A) associated with an event, broad patterns, or trends of history;
- B) associated with an important person(s);
- C) embody typical features of a type, period, or construction method, that represent the work of a master, or possess high artistic values; or
- D) that have or will likely yield significant informa- tion for history or prehistory. (National Register Bulletin No.15:https://www.nps.gov/NR/PUBLICATIONS/bulletins/nrb15/)

After we do an evaluation like this one, some Section 4(f) impacts can be recognized as "de minimis," which means relatively minor. We will present information to prove no harmful impacts will occur to either historic site. We can use a Section 4(f) de minimis finding on projects that meet the conditions shown in Table 1. The de minimis impact determination finding does not require an evaluation of alternatives.

What is the proposed road project?

The Arkansas Department of Transportation (ARDOT), in conjunction with the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), proposes to do minor widening including an additional turn lane, curb-and-gutter, and sidewalks, along with a bridge replacement on Highway 190 in




Figure 3: Design Typical Section for Job 020588




Figure 6. Proposed ROW to be acquired from the Arthur J. Arney & Company Building

Jefferson County (Figure 3). See Figure 4 for the project location. This project requires minor right of way acquisition from both historic properties (shown in Figures 5 and 6).

Why are these historic sites important?

State Highway Department District 2 Complex

The State Highway Department District 2 Complex is a notable example of a maintenance/automotive complex. The Works Progress Administration (WPA), a Depression-era New Deal program, built it in either 1938 or 1939. The complex served the Highway Department District 2 until 1966, when the City of Pine Bluff Street Department took ownership. The complex is composed of five contributing buildings and one sign, all of which are likely original to the complex.

While some alterations have occurred, the complex has retained the majority of its character-defining features and its use. The State Highway Department District 2 Complex is eligible for inclusion in the NRHP under Criterion A for its association with the WPA. It is also eligible under Criterion C as these buildings embody typical features and a construction method that represents the workmanship of the WPA.

Arthur J. Arney & Company Building


The Arthur J. Arney & Company Building is a good example of Quonset hut construction with the addition of vernacular stonework. The building retains the original shape, rectangular plan, and oversized side door and is a good representative of the post-war re-use of materials. The stonework on the front facade, likely added by Arney, remains a distinctive feature not commonly seen on Quonset huts. The Arthur J. Arney & Company Building is eligible for inclusion in the NRHP under Criterion C as a notable example of a Quonset hut structure in the post-war years.


What was the Works Projects Administration?

The Works Progress Administration (WPA), later renamed the Works Projects Administration in 1939, came into existence under President Franklin Delano Roosevelt's New Deal. WPA operations in Arkansas dated from 1935 through June 1943. The program employed Arkansans to construct roads, bridges, and culverts, as well as some public buildings. The WPA structures are known for craftsmanship created through concrete and stone construction.

What is a Quonset hut?

Quonset huts display a metal outer shell in a half-cylinder shape with a rectangular plan. These structures originated in World War I for ease of installing, dismantling, and transporting.
Originally intended for defense and worker housing, the United States military began selling surplus Quonset huts following World War II.





How will the project affect the historic sites?

State Highway Department District 2 Complex

The roadway improvements will require 0.21 acres (9,148 square feet) of the State Highway Department District 2 Complex land to be acquired on the west side of Highway 190, as shown in Figure 5. The acquired acres include a fence denoting the current property boundary and a line of oak and pine trees along 157 feet of the 461-foot fence. The proposed right of way (ROW) will likely include the entire tree barrier, which may not have been original to the property. The trees provide little vegetative screen for the complex, so no visual impacts will occur. The impacts will not affect the use of the complex. Vehicular access will remain at existing locations.

How are impacts to historic sites determined?

The National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, includes a provision for historic properties known as Section 106 that applies if federal funds, permits, or properties are involved. Section 106 is implemented in 36 CFR Part 800. These regulations require consultation with the SHPO.

Impacts may be direct, indirect, or foreseeable.

The lead federal agency must determine if the effects of the project alter the characteristics of a historic property that qualify it for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places in a manner that diminishes the integrity of the property's location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling, or association.

The minor reduction in acreage from the property will not greatly alter the existing setting or any of the characteristics of the site that convey its historic significance. The archeological survey failed to find any intact deposits or features within the proposed ROW. Through consultation with the SHPO, a finding of No Adverse Effect for the State Highway Department District 2 Complex was proposed and agreed upon pursuant to 36 CFR § 800.5(b).

Arthur J. Arney & Company Building

The improvements will require 0.01 acres (436 square feet) of the Arthur J. Arney & Company Building land to be acquired on the east side of Highway 190. The impacts are shown in Figure 6. A concrete/asphalt parking lot is directly adjoined to the roadway. The proposed ROW will include most, if not all, of the current parking lot.

No visual impacts are expected to occur. A concrete/asphalt surface already exists directly in front of the building, so moving the roadway closer to the building will not diminish the integrity of setting. The minor reduction of acreage from the property will not alter any of the characteristics of the site that convey its significance. Through consultation with the SHPO, a finding of No Adverse Effect to the Arthur J. Arney & Company Building was proposed and agreed upon pursuant to 36 CFR § 800.5(b).

What was done to reduce harm to the historic sites?

The historic sites are on opposite sides of the current two-lane road. ROW acquisition from only one side of the roadway would have potentially resulted in an Adverse Effect determination to one of the historic sites. The improvements were centered along the roadway to reduce ROW acquisition on both sides of the roadway and reduce harm to the historic sites.

Who was involved in this evaluation?

A Public Notice in the local newspaper has invited everyone to review and comment on the proposed project's impacts. No comments regarding impacts to the State Highway Department District 2 Complex or the Arthur J. Arney & Company Building were received.

A public involvement meeting was held on April 30, 2019. At this meeting, the proposed project's impacts were presented on displays and handouts, with the opportunity to comment on the project. No comments regarding impacts to the State Highway Department District 2 Complex or the Arthur J. Arney & Company Building were received.

The SHPO has agreed that this project will have No Adverse Effect on the State Highway Department District 2 Complex and the Arthur J. Arney & Company Building. SHPO correspondence is included in Appendix A.

What is the decision?

This evaluation shows that the proposed roadway improvements will not harm the protected features or qualities that make the historic sites important under Section 4(f), thus qualifying for a *de minimis* finding on the State Highway Department District 2 Complex and the Arthur J. Arney & Company Building.

How is a *de minimis* impact determination reached?

A *de minimis* impact is one that, after taking into account any measures to minimize harm (such as avoidance, minimization, mitigation or enhancement measures), results in either:

The staff of the Arkansas Historic Preservation Program (AHPP) reviewed the cultural resources survey (CRS) for the above-referenced project. The proposed undertaking entails widening State Highway 190 from two 11-foot travel lanes with no shoulder to three 12-foot travel lanes with curbs and gutter, Additional work will include sidewalk construction from 11th Avenue to Harding Avenue in Pine Bluff. The length of the area of potential effects (APE) in .40 miles (.64 kilometers). The width of the proposed right-of-(ROW) will expand from 58 to 68 feet to 72 to 153 feet (at the bridge over Bayou Imbeau). The project will require acquisition of additional ROW.

The investigation documented one new archeological site: 3JE0513. The site appears to be the remnants of an early to mid-twentieth century structure. The AHPP concurs that Site 3JE0513 is not eligible for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) pursuant to 36 CFR § 60.4.

The proposed undertaking will affect the State Highway Department District #2 Complex (AHPP Resource Number JE0908). The complex consists of five contributing Works Progress Administration buildings (4a-4f). In 2007, the property was determined eligible for inclusion in the NRHP under Criteria A and C. The ROW expansion will require acquisition of .21 acres of the property. The largest portion of this acquisition will be an existing paved parking lot. The remaining acquired area will include a fence and tree line. The AHPP concurs with the finding of No Adverse Effect pursuant to 36 CFR § 800.5(b) for JE0908.

Property 9 is a Quonset hut with vernacular stonework built in 1949. The property possesses integrity and retains the majority of its character defining features. The AHPP concurs that Property 9 is eligible for inclusion in the

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NRHP under Criterion C pursuant to 36 CFR § 60.4. Additional ROW expansion will require acquisition of .01 acres of a paved parking lot associated with Property 9. The AHPP concurs with the finding of No Adverse Effect pursuant to 36 CFR § 800.5(b) for Property 9.

The project is within an area of interest for several federally recognized tribes, including the Caddo Nation (Ms. Tamara Francis), the Cherokee Nation (Ms. Elizabeth Toombs), the Chickasaw Nation (Ms. Karen Brunso), the Choctaw Nation of Oklahoma (Mr. Daniel Ragle), the Jena Band of Choctaw Indians (Ms. Alina J. 
